It enables a library to scrutinize the adequacy of its collection and to identify any gaps by reviewing Interlibrary Loan reports. Sarah Tusa will demonstrate a few of the features of this service and illustrate the ways it can aid in collection management activities such as material selection and de-selection and identifying strengths and weaknesses in the library's collection relative to the academic programs we strive to support.
